MINUTES OF APRIL 17, 2006 GENERAL MEETING

FRED LIPPMANN CENTER

The HCCA general meeting was called to order on Monday, April 17, 2006, at 7:00 .M. at the Fred Lippmann Center, by Secretary, Cynthia Greene-Eason, in the absence of President Chuck Vollman and Vice President Mel Pollak..

Minutes of the March 20, 2006 were read by Secretary, Cynthia Eason, and approved.

Treasurer, Pat Smith, reported a balance of \$626.88. Report accepted subject to audit.

Pete Brewer spoke about the "Illegal Art" exhibit at the Hollywood Art and Culture Center, and passed around two paintings which he found particularly objectionable. His concern was that there were no restrictions to access of the presentation of questionable art depicting sex acts. He also stated that art and taste can be objective or subjective. However, art presented for public viewing in a center supported by the public should not be offensive, obscene, or insensitive to Hollywood residents and/or their children. Joy Saterlee and Samantha Salvinger, representing the Art & Cultural Center, spoke in defense of the presentation.

Howard Sher stated that a compromise is needed. Other comments: signs should be posted to prevent young children from entering an area restricted to adult art and that the pictures in question were illustrations and not art. In order to pursue this matter, we would need to ask individual associations to state their feelings and what action they would recommend..

Cynthia announced that the state condo ombudsman will be at the CHB meeting on April 20 and read a letter from Mel Pollack addressing transportation issues on the Beach. The letter explored parking issues and a suggestion to provide bus service to and from Hollywood Beach to ease traffic congestion. Pat Smith suggested offsite parking in other areas of Hollywood to lessen congestion. Other issues re: the barrier island: sewerage, pumping station, etc.. Several members expressed negative feelings about beach development, and suggested that a moratorium should extend throughout the City of Hollywood.

The Sheridan Station project was discussed. Members felt that HCCA should take action on this project. Cynthia explained that President Vollman is obliged to follow protocol and obtain a consensus on this issue before any action can be taken. The project has grown to 1600 units, and there are concerns about educational facilities in addition to oak trees on the site.
